The Joe Gibson Memorial Award -Mark Swelstad

He loved caves and caving, and was passionate about conservation, exploration, and landowner relations. He loved the social aspects of the Grotto as well and was always ready to have fun, often with his favorite bourbon, Makers Mark.

Speleo Who – Andy Schofield

Tell us a bit about yourself?

When I was younger, I spent a lot of time outside primarily due to my involvement in the Boy Scouts, attaining the rank of Eagle Scout. During my early to mid-20s I took occasional backpacking or camping trips but it wasn't until my late 20s I was introduced to rock climbing and began spending significant time outdoors again. Since then, I've picked up several new outdoor related hobbies including caving and rappelling. Professionally I am a software developer in the ecommerce space. I also help organize a local security conference called Hackers Teaching Hackers (HTH). Prior to 2020 I organized and participated in monthly meetup groups but since then I've focused mainly on organizing larger events like HTH and ComFest.

How did you first get into caving?

I was introduced to caving by Joel Rannebarger and got a quick taste of caving at Carter Caves during summer 2021. We were lucky to be there on the 75th anniversary (pretty sure it was 75 but could've been another milestone) of the park acquiring two caves and the show cave tickets were \$0.75 each for the anniversary caves. We also explored two small wild caves, Horn Hollow and Laurel Cave. My first longer cave trip was to Sinks of the Roundstone with Kevin, Ana, Jaclyn, and Joel in October 2021.

What are some of your other interests?

Rock climbing is my main interest outside of caving, I travel to the New River Gorge frequently to climb. I also spent time learning Single Rope Technique this year which while used in vertical caves, I primarily learned with the goal of participating in Bridge Day 2022. Bridge Day was an awesome experience and I encourage everyone with an interest in vertical to consider participating.

What are some of your favorite caving experiences?

My favorite experiences in caves are getting to see new and interesting formations. I think formations are some of the most interesting things you can find in a cave. Exploring new (to me) areas is also fun even if someone has been there before. Project caving is also something I've started to pursue and that leads to the potential that you would be the first one ever in a cave.

What guided your decision to join COG?


I like to support groups that support my interests, so it seemed like a no brainer to join COG. I am part of New River Alliance of Climbers (NRAC), American Alpine Club (AAC), Access Fund/Ohio Climbers Coalition (OCC), National Speleological Society (NSS), and Central Ohio Grotto (COG). Climbing has seen a huge surge in popularity recently and while this is great it has created a number of access issues and sometimes caused issues with landowners. This is very similar to what cavers face in trying to get access to caves on private property.

What are you looking forward to learning or participating in as a member of COG?

I think there are many underground skills I still have to learn and get better at. Project caving comes to mind, and specifically surveying is something I'm looking forward to learning more about. I also look forward to the Sloans trips that Patrick has been planning, they have been awesome trips and it's great to see so much of the grotto there!

COG goes to Grayson Gunner Cave -Janeen Sharpshair/Wendy Orlandi

Harry Goepel or Janeen Sharpshair from the Greater Cincinnati Grotto will give a presentation of Grayson Gunner Cave during the April 2023 meeting. We will follow the presentation in the short week or two after the April meeting with a COG trip to GGC with Harry and Janeen as our guides. The actual date is still to be determined, but it's expected to take place the last weekend of April or the beginning of May. Wet suits will be required, so we want all those interested to have the necessary time to prepare for this unique underground experience. COG has a small wetsuit collection for loan that will be available first come, first served assuming the sizes we have on hand work for you. We do hope to acquire more before the trip takes place, and are asking all our grotto members to keep an eye on their local thrift stores to help grow our equipment library. There should be ample room to move in a wetsuit used for caving, so be sure to snag the biggest suits you can!

Janeen Sharpshair agreed to a Q and A to help us prepare. Thanks Janeen!

Q: What is Grayson Gunner Cave like, can you describe the trip for us?

A: GGC is a wet, horizontal cave. We'll start in the water and swimming will be required. Crawling, walking, swimming and scrambling over rimstone dams will all be in play on the first leg of the trip. Then, the group will climb out of the water and move to dry passage where we will remain in wetsuits. Look forward to crawling, climbing and borehole walking during this segment. Eventually, we will come to another belly crawl in water and then climb back out to the main passage to complete our round trip.

Q: How long does the trip take and how strenuous?

A: The trip will take about 4-6 hours. Difficulty is somewhere between moderate to difficult. You **must** be able to swim and be comfortable in water. If you can't swim and aren't comfortable in wet passage, this is **NOT** the trip for you.

Q: Where is Grayson Gunner Cave?

A: GGC is in Wayne County, Kentucky. Please note: GGC is on private property. The landowners value their privacy, and the cave should not be visited without prior contact and approval from the owners.

Q: How do we prepare for a wet cave trip?

Everyone is different, but some combination of wetsuit and other coldgear will be required. Harry wears a shortie with long underwear, while I wear a full wetsuit and then put on a second layer when out of water and in the dry passage (i.e. long underwear over wetsuit). Wool socks, boots, and knee pads are important. I also wear regular gardening gloves.

Q: Does GCG ever flood?

A: Being spring, water could be higher and a bit sporty, but GCG rarely floods. The water flow can be fast enough that it will take your knee pads off. We will contact the landowner in the days leading up to the trip to gauge water flow. If we determine it's unsafe in any way, we will reschedule.

COG Shopping List

COG is in the process of adding wetsuits to our equipment library. We are planning a wet trip in the Spring and would like everyone to prepare for it ahead of time.

Buying Tips:

- Buy second hand. They can be found for as little as 5 bucks.
- Buy big. You will need room to flex your cave moves.
- Buy thick, 3-5 mm will be warmer if you tend to run cold.
- Buy ANYTHING. Farmer John's, shorties, it's all good!
- Buy extra. I'd like to build a library, so donate an extra if you find a good deal!
